## Elementary students learning through hands-on problem solving

Harrisonville elementary students are gaining critical thinking and problem solving skills, while learning math, science, technology and engineering through the new Project Lead the Way curriculum.

Project Lead the Way seeks to introduce science concepts through hands-on learning. Students begin each unit or module with a story featuring a challenge that students will work together to solve through a series of activities.

For example, in their first unit on the human body, kindergarten students listened to a story about a child who suffered a broken arm.

Kindergarten teacher Lauren Peterson said, "During our module we got to learn about how many bones we have and why we have so many bones in our hands; we got to explore the lungs, stomach, muscles

## Royal Regiment completes successful competition season

The Harrisonville High School Royal Regiment Marching Band wrapped up a successful season at the end of October. The band brought home trophies from every competition.

At the first competition at Carl Junction in late September, the band competed against 16 bands. They won first in their division, best color guard in their division, and advanced to finals. In finals, they earned fourth place out of all bands in all classes, as well as best overall drum major and best overall color guard.

The Royal Regiment had three weekends of competition in a row during the month of October follow-

ing their appearance in the Burnt District Festival Parade during the first weekend of the month.

At Park Hill, the band earned second in their division and fifth overall. The following Saturday, the band traveled to Odessa and brought home another second place in their division and fifth overall out of 18 bands. The color guard was also honored with the Outstanding Color Guard award.

### Focusing on Essential Standards, attendance

Greetings from the Student Services Department. We hope you and your family have had a great



start to the school year. It is amazing how fast time goes by. I am excited to be in my 18th year in the District, third as Assistant Superintendent. This year I have moved over to Student Services which includes Curriculum/Assessment, Professional Development, and Federal Programs to name a few areas we work in.

We have many focuses in curriculum and instruction this year in the effort to improve student learning. Last year teacher teams created District Essential Standards for each

grade level in English language arts (ELA), math, and science. These Essential Standards are based around the Missouri Learning Standards and are what, we as a district, believe to be the most important learning for each grade level. The Essential Standards for each grade and subject can be found on the District website, by going to Departments, Academic Services, then clicking on the Curriculum and Instruction link.

As simple as it sounds, we are focusing our instruction around these Essential Standards. Teachers are developing lessons and planning activities around them; principals are having discussions with teachers about resources and professional development needed to teach the Essential Standards; and we are monitoring student progress on the Essential Standards.

The way we are monitoring stu-

dent progress on Essential Standards is through the use of Mastery Connect in grades K-8 and USATestprep in the high school core classes. Elementary and middle school parents received Mastery Connect progress reports at Parent/ Teacher conferences after first quarter. Parents can track their own student's progress in Mastery Conanvtime Masteryconnect.com. Core Teachers (ELA, math, science, and social studies) at HHS are creating tests around our Essential Standards in USATestprep. Much like Mastery Connect, this program allows teachers to drill down to individual student progress on specific standards. As a District, we believe tracking progress on our Essential Standards gives everyone a clearer picture of what our students have, and have not, learned. Thus, allowing us to assign support and enrichment to

individual students.

An area we continue to look to improve on is student attendance. It is so important for learning that students to be in school whenever possible. Every minute counts! It is hard to make up for lost instruction when a student misses a lesson. Also, attendance is one of the areas we are graded on by the State Department of Education. In the 2016-17 school year our District received 7.5 out of 10 points possible from the State for attendance. If we met our goal of 90% of our students being in school 90% of the time, we should receive all 10 points next year. In our current school calendar, a student can miss eight full days of school and still make 95% attendance. Our overall district attendance for the year was 93% as



Enrollment for the 2018-2019 Practical Nursing program has begun! Individuals wishing to apply to the program must have a high school diploma or GED, and obtain a satisfactory score on a general knowledge entrance exam (ATI TEAS Exam). A \$75 non-refundable testing fee must be submitted to reserve a testing spot for the ATI TEAS Exam. Due to limited testing space and

class size, potential students are advised to test early.

Visit casscareercenter.com and click on the "Practical Nursing" link to request an information packet, learn more about the TEAS Exam & the exam dates, and learn how to apply for

the program.

Upon satisfactory completion of the program, graduates are eligible to apply to the MO State Board of Nursing for permission to take the licensing examination. A passing score on the exam qualifies the graduate for Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) status in Missouri.

Financial Aid is available to qualified students. Applicants must take and pass the ATI TEAS Exam to be eligible for consideration to the PN program. PRE-REGISTRATION FOR TESTING IS A MUST! TEAS Exams are given at Cass Career Center. Student may test two times, but must allow 21 days between tests. Student is not officially registered for TEAS Exam until testing fee of \$75 is submitted. All applications, reference forms and testing must be completed by March 31, 2018.



## Science goes beyond facts to critical thinking, real-world connections

(Continued from pg 1)

"The hands-on approach along with the model which scaffolds student work from structured to free thinking is great," said McEowen teacher Pat Snider. "I think this program will help develop the critical thinking skills our kids need to solve problems in general."

No longer are students learning science from a textbook.

"Students are investigating, designing, and modeling through hands-on experiences. This affords them the opportunities to make knowledge active and apply it in real time," said McEowen teacher Megan Gordon.

An example of the real time learning came when Gordon's students were doing the energy module. Students were challenged to construct a vehicle, then design and test a restraint system to protect an egg from breaking when being transported and crashing in the vehicle (pictured: fourth graders Keller Johnson and Ben Wooten show off their egg-carrying vehicle).

"They loved it and so did I because of all the critical thinking and problem solving involved," said Mrs. Gordon. "Needless to say, I

bought extra eggs so could test the restraint systems as many times as needed. W e cracked a lot of eggs and learned

a ton in

the process!"

She went on to say, "The best part for me was seeing the transfer of information as students under-

stood the connection between the restraints they designed and seat belt safety."

With students engaged in handson learning, the teacher's role changes.

Harrisonville Elementary School teacher Mishelle Pauley said, "The teacher acts as the facilitator, not the teacher, which allows the kids to control their learning somewhat."

"We have a lot of conversations

2" about why students think the year

about why students think the way they do and how they could make something better. It has really helped with 'if at first you don't succeed try again," said Mrs. Peterson.

All the teachers agree that student engagement has increased.

McEowen teacher Jacob VanSlyke said, "You can feel the excitement when they find out we are going to the lab for PLTW."

Mrs. Gordon added, "I believe we are giving our students an edge in the real world that begins now as they experience science in a whole new way."

When winter weather strikes, the district monitors temperatures, wind chills, and road conditions, and will inform parents as early as possible if a decision is made to cancel school. Cancellation information will be shared through the district's automated calling and texting system (SchoolMessenger), Facebook, Twitter, the district app, and the website and on local TV stations.

Safety is priority number one when making the determination to cancel school on any given day due to inclement weather. If snow, ice, or extreme cold make conditions unsafe, the district will cancel school.

There may also be days when the decision is made to delay the start time of school as conditions are expected to improve.

On these days and other days when it's very cold, there are a few reminders for parents...

- Please make sure that your children come to school dressed for the weather, with winter coats, hats, and gloves.
- If a child walks to school, we ask that parents try to make arrangements for the child to be given a ride to school. In some neighborhoods, parents form emergency carpools and this works well.
- If the child is a bus rider, we again encourage parents to make sure their child is dressed appropriately. We also encourage parents to let the child wait in the car with them until the bus comes (or, again, make arrangements so that several children can wait together in one car).

Being in school is important for many reasons, including that instructional time is valuable to all students. Additionally, schools are safe places to be for students. Students have adult supervision throughout the day and, should they stay home on a cold day, in some cases there may be no supervision available.

(Continued from page 3) minute a student misses school matters when it comes to their opportunity for academic success. A few things for parents to consider...

- Try to schedule appointments on days off or after school. However, if you have to schedule an appointment during a school day, please try to only take your child out of school for the actual appointment.
- Please be sure that your student arrives to school on time every day.
- Try to avoid checking your child out early.

The district also wants to stress the importance of developing good attendance as a habit. If students learn the importance of being on time and at school during their K-12 experience, it

can only benefit them as they move into life after high school. Although attendance isn't something you will see on a resume, it is a skill that employers value. By focusing on attendance together, we can improve in this area.

(Continued from pg. 19) last several weeks has been a series of commercials for the Harrisonville Police Department's Shop with a Cop program. The videos feature well-known "cops" and their adversaries, along with their famous cars including the Blues Brothers, Dukes of Hazzard, and Smokey and the Bandit.

Senior JT Overturf said, "I love working with all the new people and police officers and of course the super cool cars that we've worked with. It's also amazing seeing my video that my group and I created up on the scoreboard during sports events and the fact that they have been posting them on their Facebook page and getting thousands of views."

Senior Sydney Graves echoed Overturf's sentiment. "My favorite project so far would be Shop with a Cop because we get to help the cops make a video for a good cause."

In addition to the finished product and technical skills, the students are gaining valuable experience working with others.

"Soft skills are an important aspect of this course. As students work with the community, they have to communicate, film and interact in a professional manner," said Mr. Kohl. "They also problem solve how to do shots and turn a vision of someone's idea into a finished production that we hope many people want to watch."

A project still in progress for the Keys to Community program highlighted these soft skills for at least one student.

"I am enjoying it because of the different people I have been able to meet and interview all kinds of people with different backgrounds," said senior Zach Walsh. Junior Hunter Carlton said his favorite part of the class is "the people because everyone works great together."

Not only are the students learning valuable skills, they really enjoy coming to the class each day.

Senior Chase Laizure said, "This class is different from most of my other classes in multiple ways. We aren't stuck at a desk taking notes and getting restless; we get to hop on computers and edit, go out in the community to shoot video during hour, interview and talk to people we may never have the chance to before, and go in places you typically wouldn't be in."

Walsh said, 'This class really allows me to use my imagination with very little to no restrictions other than the restrictions of what you can

think of. It also allows me to get a real world sense of media work."

Students are learning skills that are immediately applicable in the workforce.

"Students learn video camera operation, video editing, operating a live switch (switching from one camera to the another in a live show), and cutting live shots into replays. These are real world skills students can earn scholarships to college and do for a career," said Mr. Kohl. "Some of my students have worked for Fidelity Communications while in high school. Any live sporting event on television has a crew doing the same things these students are learning and practicing right now."

Students outside the WCN class are recruited for the AV team

for sporting events as it takes a crew of 5-6 people to make a "live" event possible.

Barnard said, "My favorite part of the class is getting to film at the sporting events. It is awesome to be a part of something like that and support the teams."

Students will be continuing their work second semester with "live" basketball game productions, more commercials and 'This Week in the District' features, as well as projects they write and create themselves.
